Julie Townsend was right to protect market from disruptor

I'm writing in response to the Ledger article "Conservative internet personality argues her free speech was violated at Lakeland Farmers Market" [May 25,

While I was not present during the incident, I interacted with Kaitlin Bennett at the same market just a week prior. The encounter was not a good-faith conversation — it was engineered to provoke reactions for online content. She and her team filmed without asking for consent, asked inflammatory political questions and made no effort to engage respectfully.

From what I understand, her latest appearance followed a similar pattern. She positioned herself in the vendor area - where space is paid for and reserved - causing disruption and deterring or provoking customers. The facilitator, Julie Townsend, simply asked her to move away from vendors so the market could continue operating smoothly.

This isn't a free speech violation, it's a commonsense decision to protect a community space from being hijacked by a clout-chaser farming for clicks.

I hope The Ledger will continue to cover this story with a focus on the broader community and the people working hard to create safe, welcoming spaces. The community stands with Julie Townsend, The LDDA, and the Lakeland Farmer's Curb Market team.

'Big Beautiful Bill' is a \$20 trillion debt bomb

Donald Trump's "Big Beautiful Bill" passed the House on May 22 and is now in the Senate, where it can be amended to avoid fiscal ruin.

The bill adds \$3.3 trillion to \$6.9 trillion to our deficit over 10 years, pushing our debt-to-GDP ratio to 125%. With \$952 billion in annual interest costs, this pork-laden bill threatens Lakeland families with dollar devaluation by 2030.
